

The remainder came from bonds issued by the city's Downtown Development Authority. During its first five years, the arena turned a profit of at least \$1.38 million annually, matching only the most optimistic projections, with an average attendance of 1 million per year. The plant serves the entire network of central downtown heating, making the individual heating of buildings unnecessary. In the 1990's, it was connected to the new county waste incinerator at 1100 Market S.W.

201 Fulton W. Plaza Towers. Formerly Eastbank Waterfront Towers. Occupants began moving into Grand Rapids' tallest building in April, 1991. Situated on the east bank of the Grand River, the 32-story, \$63 million project includes 149 condominiums, 133 apartments, and a 214-room hotel. Developer was Edward Havlik. Eastbank Festival Place opened in 1992 as a part of the Eastbank project, with a deli supermarket, a dry cleaner, a florist, a card store, a shoe repair shop, and Kinko's copy center. When the deli closed in October, 1994, Kinko's was the only store left in the complex, having expanded into space left by other vacating stores. The Radisson Hotel closed in September, 1995. The entire building was closed for nearly two years for repairs to correct structural defects. The bulk of litigation surrounded a faulty exterior wall panel system. Citadel Corporation was the original project's general contractor, and had sued the developers for nonpayment after the problems surfaced. Problems with the exterior of the structure leaking were first noticed during spring rains in 1991, less than a year after the building's opening. Purchased by Amway and renamed Plaza Towers, the complex reopened on May 1, 1997. Reconstruction had cost \$30 million and took nearly 21 months to complete. (GRBJ, September 7, 1999, pp. 1, 7.)

Fulton Street Bridge. The Massillon Bridge Co. of Massillon, Ohio, built the old bridge here in 1885. It was removed in 1927 and replaced with a concrete bridge dedicated to William Dean. The plaque on the bridge reads:

Dedicated September 9, 1928 to William H. Dean, a citizen of Grand Rapids, born January 6, 1878, died May 3, 1928. A member of the 7th U.S. Cavalry stationed at Havan, Cuba, 1900. First from the ranks to offer himself a martyr in the research of yellow fever transmission, giving his health and making the supremem sacrifice. A noble deed for humanity's sake.

357 Fulton W. The Hotel Derby, later the Vernon Hotel, was built on the northeast corner of Fulton and Mount Vernon in 1886 by John Thomas Strahan (Baxter, p. 768).





At some point, likely in the early 1950's, the decorative turret and part of the cornice on the Mount Vernon Avenue side were removed. In its later years, the hotel was operated by William and Henry T. Vry and their family as a comfortable retirement home for railroad pensioners. The Vry family sold the building to the State Highway Department for \$77,500, and it was demolished in February, 1959, for the US-131 expressway. (Old #39. 1300 Fulton W. John Ball Park. John Ball was born at Tenny's Hill near Hebron, New Hampshire, on November 12, 1794. He arrived in Grand Rapids in 1836 as a land agent for East Coast investors and decided to stay. He opened a law practice the following year, and then was elected to the first Michigan legislature. In 1838 he built a house at 458 Fulton E. and lived there the rest of his long life. He served on the Grand Rapids Board of Education for 21 years, from 1848 to 1869. He married Mary T. Webster, a school teacher, on December 31, 1849. John Ball died on February 3, 1884, leaving 40 acres to Grand Rapids for the park which bears his name. A bronze statue in his honor, designed by Gertrude VanHouten and executed by Pompeo Coppini, was dedicated at the park on September 20, 1925. The sculpture of John Ball with two children at the entrance to the zoo had been mis-identified since the mid-1960's. The girl is a Ball cousin, Virginia. The boy is Albert (Bob) Ball, great-grandson of the pioneer (cf. Ed White, "Fixing History," GRP 07/27/2001 A1 & A4). Albert's sister, Josephine Ball Brokaw, helped to set the story straight.
