1033 Lake Drive, S.E. This magnificent 3-story, 17-room dwelling was built in 1872-73 by Augustus Paddock, a Great Lakes ship captain during the



lumbering era. A huge portrait of "the Gibson Emilv Clark, popularized in the late 1800's by artist Charles Dona Gibson, dominates one wall in the main dinina room. The portrait and subsequent restaurant name were selected as a tribute to Mrs. Clark, who lived mansion from 1892, when she

married local lumberman Melvin J. Clark, until her death in 1927. At that time, Edmund and Marguerite Wurzburg and their family owned the huge home. Edmund was the founder of what once was West Michigan's leading department store in the heart of Grand Rapids; Marguerite was a Clark. The most recent residents were the Polish Franciscan Fathers from Pulaski, WI, who announced their purchase of the home from the Clark estate for The estate had been neglected for some years, and the Franciscans spent some \$12,000 restoring the original beauty of the building and grounds. It became St. Bernardine's Friary, a mission house and home for up to eight priests and brothers. They occupied it until several years before it was transformed into Gibson's Restaurant in 1983. Gibson's closed and the mansion was sold to Greg Gilmore, whose family owns the Gilmore Collection of West Michigan restaurants. renovation of several months, the restaurant reopened on December 12, 2005, as Mangiamo, an Italian-themed restaurant, with a separate dining room called The Library replacing the former Grapevine lounge. VanDrunen, the night club owner, was arrested for federal tax evasion and the business filed for Chapter 7 bankruptcy. Reopened by new owner Mark London as the "Works," an industrial-theme night club, on November 10, 1993. By July, 1995, the building was up for sale again, offering the real estate, business equipment, fixtures, Class "C" liquor license and SDH license, approximately 10,000 square feet of space on .55 acre with 56 parking spaces.
