

385 Leonard N.E. St. John's Home. It was on August 25, 1889, that St. John's Home, for the homeless, neglected, and dependent children of the Grand Rapids diocese, was



dedicated and opened under the direction of Mother Mary Aquinata, of the Dominican Sisters. The opening of the institution had been made possible by the generosity of John T. Clancy, pioneer lumberman, who made a donation of \$60,000 to Bp. Henry J. Richter, for a children's orphanage. Named for Mr. Clancy's patron saint, the institution served the dual purpose of motherhouse for the Dominican Sisters and for the care of children until 1922, when Marywood was completed and

dedicated for the Sisters. (Mr. Clancy's mansion still stands at 401 Leonard St., N.E., across North Avenue from the site of the Home.)

In charge of children's services at the opening of the orphanage was Sister Mary Adelaide, who remained as superior for 14 years. As is the history of children's institutions, the Sisters for many years directed the program_alone. Later a social service department, staffed by lay persons, was opened to intensify the boarding home and the adoptive placement programs. Nursery care for children too young to be placed at St. John's was rendered through St. Mary's Hospital, as it continued into the 1950's.

Superiors of the Sisters at the Home since Sister Mary Adelaide were: Sister Mary Genevieve; Sister Thomas Margaret, later of Marywood; and in 1949, at the 60th



anniversary of the Home, Sister Mary Martin. In 1946 the reorganization of the social welfare program in the diocese brought about the detachment of the social services department from the Home to form a separate agency, the Diocesan Catholic Service Bureau. The Bureau, originally located at 329 Monroe Ave., N.W., in the Catholic Information Center building, investigated all requests for placement of children in the Home and

made the placements as well as recommending discharges.

Longest record of service in the Home among the Sisters was that of Sister Mary Matthia, who served as treasurer from 1895 into the 1950's, except for a short interval. Superintendent of the Home in 1949 was Fr. Joseph C. Walen, and the chaplain was Fr. Charles A. Salatka.


There were, in the late 1940's, still some old residents of Grand Rapids who remembered the occasion. Some saved the silk ribbon badges that were distributed. Among those treasuring such a keepsake was Arthur O'Brien, of St. Alphonsus parish, who lived in the neighborhood and who kept the badge his mother gave him many years previously. Like any diocesan children's institution, St. John's was woven deeply into

the tradition of the city and the diocese. It grew to be synonymous with charity, and was known as the haven for the needy child to Catholic and non-Catholic alike.

Well remembered by old Grand Rapids residents were the annual suppers conducted to raise funds for the operation of the orphanage. Until the federation of welfare fund drives was accepted by the community after the end of World War I, revenue derived from the suppers constituted an important part of the budget for the Home.

No statistics were ever compiled to show the total number of children who found a home at St. John's over the years. In the late 1940's, the number of children cared for each year at St. John's grew smaller with increased emphasis on foster home placement. The division of the diocese in 1938 likewise resulted in a reduction of children admitted to care.

Harry L. Mead, Grand Rapids architect, a member of the advisory board of the Home for many years, noted that the building itself was erected in three sections. The



first or west end of the Home was constructed and opened in 1889. The second and center section was built a year later, with the third or east section erected in 1909. (Margaret Milanowski's article in the Western Michigan Catholic in August, 1949, gave alternate dates: "An addition to the original building at the orphange was made in 1899, and a third section was added in 1913.") Elevated on a hill at Leonard Street and Lafayette Avenue, the building with its two towers

became something of a landmark in the northeastern section of Grand Rapids. The tower, built in 1889, 98 feet in height, was in need of much repair by 1949, and the Home was told that it had to be reinforced or removed. The entire building was razed in December, 1960, to be replaced with a modern, more compact facility which is now used as the Creston Ridge home of the HOPE Network.
