35 Michigan N.E. Tower 35 medical office building was built during 2010. It is connected to the Helen DeVos Children's Hospital, part of the Butterworth Hospital complex, by a steel and concrete, glass-clad truss-system bridge spanning Michigan Street. The majority of the bridge is made of structural pipe. The steel is 200 feet long and 50 feet tall. The bridge contains 14,000 feet of glass, 300 pieces on the west side and 328 on the east side; only two pf the pieces are the same dimensions. The sweeping design features a myriad of unique angles, making the bridge an engineering challenge. The bridge relies on its connections to the two buildings, as well as an intermediate support on the north side of Michigan. Design architect was Jonathan Bailey and Associates, and the project architect was URS. Wolverine Construction Management and Turner Construction supervised the project.

The extraalarm fire caused а loss \$26,745.43, while the theater's total
